I am writing this on the day after our celebration. I am nearly struck silent reflecting on the memory of it, despite the well known fact that silence is not among my chief characteristics! But the memory of it is precisely why my ability to respond is so limited, since the gift of your presence-- to say nothing of your generous gift, was so "over the top".

Thank you! Patti and I will never forget that day.

For me December 18, 2011, was a day I believe I may have attained the summit of a mountain I have been climbing for over two generations.

From a spiritual and emotional perspective, the slope was very dangerous. If I am wrong and still have a way to go before attaining that summit, at least, for the first time I can see it. The slope seems less

steep. That's why thanking you for the day is not enough. I must thank you for the fifteen years and four



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months I have served, initially Covington, First, and then Community of Faith Presbyterian Church.

I can't name names of all who helped my climb, or cite specific events that instructed. In the first case I would leave somebody important out, and in the second, there are simply too many instances of instruction and example that I received from you that have helped me along the journey up the slope.

Now I will tell you a secret. Sometimes people see ministers as men or women who are significant to their growth and spiritual awareness-- and that can be true. But the secret is that the opposite side of the coin is equally (even "more equally" true). I have learned so much from you about patience, courage, tolerance, and love. You have all-- and here I emphasize all-- helped me in becoming a better man than I was when I came here.

What I will miss the most is the sound of your conversation in the narthex just before I come down the stairs from the study for worship. Your muted words burbled like the sound of the proverbial stream of living waters

which, of course, you are. No matter how I might have felt on a particular Sunday, that has always made my heart joyful to hear you and be reminded that you are glad to be there, in a safe place and among friends.

Slowly I am becoming aware of how much I will miss you as your names tumble through my mind. There is some hope that we will have an opportunity to run into each other from time to time as Patti and I intend to stay in our little nest on Altavia Avenue in Park Hills for the present.

It is our prayer, that we will remain your friends as you will all remain ours.

May God continue to bless you with the gift of each one to each other.

FILM CAPSULES

War Horse

Rated PG013. running time: 2 hours.
Luke 2:13-14

Stephen Spielberg's first of two films to be released in December (*Tintin* will be out within a week) will win the hearts of those who loved *Black Beauty* or *The Black Stallion*. When an English father foolishly buys a thorough bread horse for plowing his field, his son works hard to train the high-spirited animal to pull a plow. The bond developed between them remains strong, even when the father has to sell Joey (the horse's name) to a cavalry officer at the beginning of World War One. There follows a series of adventures, some of them horrendous as Joey passes through the hands of various humans amidst the carnage of the war. As usual, the director brings out the humanity to be found on both sides of the battle lines. One of the best films of the year.

The Muppets

Rated. Running time: 1 hour 38 min.
Proverbs 17:17.

Even though Frank Oz declined to participate, the filmmakers recapture the wry humour and good nature of the Muppet gang, thus introducing a new generation to this deliriously amusing bunch. The theme is an old one—"Let's put on a show." This time presided over by two human Muppet

fans a TV show to raise money to save the original Muppets Theatre from being torn down by a greedy Texas oil baron who wants to drill for the oil lying under ground.

New Year's Eve

Rated PG-13. Running time: 1 hour 58 min. Ecclesiastes 3:1-2.

Boasting a screen full of stars, Gary Marshall's latest work is similar to a Robert Altman film (remember *Nashville*?) with its large ensemble cast, but lacking the depth of any of the great master's. Hilary Swank is in charge of operations involving the dropping of the ball in Times Square on New Year's Eve when it becomes stuck during a daytime trial run. As she struggles to overcome obstacles, a number of other stories—of a broken romance, the revival of hope, a dying man's last wish, and a wife with her Army husband far off in the Middle East—are interwoven. Enjoyable if you are not expecting a whole lot.

Sherlock Holmes:

A Game of Shadows

Rated PG-13. Running time: 2 hours 9 min. Ecclesiastes 8:11-13 The Message

Purists might be even more upset by all the anachronisms in this second computer effects-driven film of Arthur Conan Doyle's super sleuth, but action fans, meaning the majority of young adults, have taken so to the film that it was the top drawing film during the

weekend of its release. The fast-paced plot involves our martial arts hero and his newly married associate trying to thwart the evil Prof. Moriarty from starting World War One 23 years early.

Melancholia

Rated R. Our Ratings: Running time: 1 hour 37 min. Ecc. 1:1, 2:22-23 One expects a Lars von Trier film to be a bit weird, and this new one about the impending end of the world is no exception. Kirsten Dunst has received a lot of Oscar buzz as the almost manically depressed bride who manages to end her marriage on the night of her wedding reception. In part 2 of the film focusing on her sister we see the onrushing planet, named Melancholia, looming in the sky as the sister's husband assures them that it will pass them by. Somewhat similar to *Another Earth*, and even *Tree of Life*, this film reflects the deeply pessimistic view of its auteur.

Arthur Christmas

Rated PG-13. Running time: 1 hour 37 min. Luke 10:12:6-7 NIV

Most Santa Claus movies are dismal attempts to find humor and to update the old Santa Claus myth, failing to be either funny or to bring it into to-

day's more cynical world. (Of course, the original *Miracle on 34th Street* is the notable exception!) This animated film truly does have heart and is close in theme to Jesus solicitous concern about sparrows and "the least of these, my brethren." When Santa Clause and his heir-apparent Steve decide not to rectify a mistake concerning a little girl in Cornwall whose wished-for bike was not delivered, Steve's adolescent bumbling son Arthur tries to deliver the bike himself before the breaking dawn of Christmas Day.

MI: Ghost Protocol

Rated PG-13. Running time: 2 hours 13 min. Psalm 36:1-4 NRSV, Ecclesiastes 8:11-13 The Message

This is a film that shows nothing is impossible if you have vast funds for computer generated effects and a public willing to believe anything—implausible plot devices and a hero able to withstand crushing blows to the head and falls/jumps from great heights that would injure or kill ordinary humans. The most enjoyable part of the film is its use of scenic locales—Moscow, Mumbai, and especially Dubai with its world's tallest skyscraper piercing the sky like a giant needle. Our team of heroes is racing to prevent a rogue terrorist from starting a nuclear conflagration between Russia and America.

Breaking Dawn Part 1**

Rated PG-13. Running time: 1 hour 57 min. John 6:53-54.

I am not a fan of the vampire genre, but this Romeo and Juliet-like series in which two heartthrob hunks, a werewolf and a vampire, have struggled to win the heart of a human maiden, have been mildly entertaining (a statement that the mostly female fans of the series will regard as the rant of an out of touch old adult). Now that fair maiden has wed vampire hunk, should they physically mate, and what would their offspring be like—and will they be able to fend off the attack of the wolves out to destroy them? As the subtitle indicates, this film does not give conclusive answers to such questions.

MANY LIVES, ONE MISSION: DREAMING TOGETHER IN GLOBAL PARTNERSHIP

Presbyterians do mission in partnership. This basic strategy has become a mature and effective way of doing mission in Nicaragua for 40 years through the global partnership of the PC(USA) and the Council of Evangelical Churches of Nicaragua (CEPAD).

CEPAD has partnered with Presbyterians since its formation in December 1972, just three days after the historic, devastating earthquake in Managua. Out of the 14 covenant relationships CEPAD currently facilitates, 13 are with PC(USA) churches or presbyteries.

As we write this, we are in the middle of a 12-state tour of the United States, visiting U.S. partners and sharing our mission stories. Many generous people are opening their homes and church doors to us, and the energy of this sharing is infectious. We have spent the past two years in Nicaragua as mission co-workers, learning to receive the wonderful hospitality of our Nicaraguan friends, and now in our own culture we can see that this God-given gift knows no boundaries.

For the first three weeks of our travels we have been accompanied by Anita Taylor, the Nicaraguan director of CEPAD's program for Brigades, Delegations and Partnerships. Anita and Leslie have preached together and presented the story of how their totally different lives have joined to begin a new story of cross-cultural mission. Together they facilitate the CEPAD Partnership program, supporting the bonds made between churches in the United States and communities in Nicaragua.

The partnership between two congregations

in Kentucky and the pastoral committee of San Carlos, Nicaragua, located in a remote spot where the giant waters of Lake Nicaragua flow into the Rio San Juan, has developed over 10 years and has thrived with commitment and communication from both sides of the border. The churches in Kentucky are the Community of Faith Presbyterian Church of Covington and the First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Madisonville, separated by 200 miles but joined by a desire to accompany their brothers and sisters in San Carlos with annual visits to Nicaragua, mutual prayer, support of the Nicaraguan community's priorities and sponsorship of Nicaraguan visits to their churches in Kentucky.

Bill Lindsay of Covington is the logistical leader of the trips to Nicaragua, and has visited his partner community more than 10 times. In reflecting on the meaning of mission for him, Lindsay said:

"As we engage with global partners, facilitated by mission workers, we are encouraged, even forced, to recognize that there are critical daily and ongoing needs of people that are far larger and more basic than our day-to-day wants at home. In partnership in the Rio San Juan region of Nicaragua, we realize that there are villages that don't have decent water, children who are not able to go to school for lack of acceptable clothing (uniforms), and individuals who go to bed hungry at night. It makes us look at needs and wants differently."

Mark Lee of the Madisonville congregation said that the experience of partnership is transformational in his life and the life of his fellow travelers. "If a person's sense of community is quite limited in scope, it is easy for one's own beliefs and practices to be seen as not only the norm but also the one true way," he said.

MANY LIVES, ONE MISSION:

“However, if one develops relationships in a broader community—relationships that value each person and recognize and celebrate differences as well as shared customs or traits—one can’t remain provincial for long. My experiences with global partners have made me more aware that the world doesn’t revolve around me or my country and culture. We all can learn so much from each other.”

The work of individual partnerships has a broader significance as well. What seems like a personal experience becomes a blessing to the global body of believers as mutual understanding becomes the norm. Lee expressed it this way: “As we work together to achieve common goals, we hopefully start to see each other as children of God, as brothers and sisters. The barriers that too often separate us—ethnic, theological, political, socioeconomic—become part of our life stories that create interest, part of what makes us who we are, and cease being the walls they too often have been.”

“Christ is present in the faces of those we meet when we sing together in churches, dance together with children, break bread and drink coffee in the homes of families, and study the successes and challenges of other partnerships,” said Lindsay.

MINUTES OF THE SESSION
COMMUNITY OF FAITH

November 10, 2011

OTHERS PRESENT: The Rev. Donald H. Smith, Jr., Moderator; Rebecca S. Lindsay, Clerk of Session.

QUORUM (4+Moderator): A quorum was present.

OPENING: The regular meeting of the Session of Community of Faith Presbyterian Church was called to order in the church parlor on Thursday, November 10, 2011, at 7:00 P.M. by the moderator, The Rev. Donald H. Smith, Jr. Rev. Smith opened the meeting with prayer.

DOCKET: The docket was approved with the addition of one item: Discussion of relations with Calvary Chin Church was placed under Unfinished Business.

MINUTES: A motion was adopted to approve as presented the minutes of the stated Session meetings on September 8, 2011, and October 13, 2011.

CLERK OF SESSION'S REPORT: The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was celebrated by intinction on Sunday, November 6, 2011, during the morning worship service. Rev. Smith presided assisted by Elders Jim Berry,

Erika Berry and Rebecca Lindsay.

Upon recommendation of the clerk, the Session voted to amend the Pastor's Report of the stated Session meeting on July 14, 2011, to include the information that Rev. Smith conducted the funeral service of Diane Gaskins (non-member) on July 11, 2011, at Dobbing, Muehlenkamp, Erschell Funeral Home, Newport, KY, and the service of committal at Evergreen Cemetery, Fort Thomas, KY, the following day.

COMMUNICATION: Notification was received from Louisville Seminary that tent-style desk calendars for 2012 were available upon request. By general consent, we will order twenty-five (25) calendars and make them available to the congregation.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Rev. Smith provided a written report. He conducted a second memorial service for Linda Eileen Smith Bowen in Zanesville, OH, on October 22, 2011. He has completed his pension documentation and has sent it to the Board of Pensions in Philadelphia. He plans to take a vacation day on November 11, 2011.

TRUSTEES: President Dawn Farwick reported that we had to have repairs done on the furnace. The

bill for the repairs has not yet been received. Trustees are waiting to see about the expense on the furnace before deciding what to do about the stove in the kitchen that was damaged by the squirrel.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer Gary Willis provided a written report of the church's finances over the past month. The treasurer's report will be filed.

UMBRELLA REPORTS: ADMINISTRATION AND PROPERTY: (See Trustees' Report.)

CONGREGATIONAL CARE: Elder Erika Berry gave the following schedule for fellowship activities during Advent and Christmas:

- Saturday, November 26 – “Deck the Halls.” Beginning at 10:00 A.M., the sanctuary and narthex will be decorated. The tree in the narthex will be decorated with christmons.
- Sunday, November 27 – Advent begins.
- Saturday, December 17 – The fellowship hall will be decorated.

Sunday, December 18 – Lessons and Carols during morning worship followed by a catered dinner. Contributions toward the dinner will be appreciated.

The movie group is planning to meet again.

The umbrella is continuing to work on preparing the Nursery/Preschool room. A wagon would be useful in moving toys to the narthex for young children who spend time in that space accompanied by their parents during the Sunday morning worship service.

MISSION AND EVANGELISM: Elder Jack Kleier reported that the stewardship campaign had been completed. The umbrella is gearing up for Christmas mission—Be Concerned, Buckhorn, Ludlow Giving Tree, and the Christmas Joy Offering. Christmas cards for the Troops will be collected in early December.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: Calvary Chin Church: Concerns raised during at the Stewardship luncheon on October 30 were discussed. The issues centered around housekeeping problems and the reduction in rent granted to the Chin Church. The session discussed drawing up a contract with the Calvary Chin Church specifying what our expectations are for the use of the building. Rev. Smith will investigate what other churches have done. He will ask to speak directly

to the Chin congregation on matters that are troubling the COF congregation.

Report on November Presbytery Meeting: Clerk Rebecca Lindsay reported for Commissioner William Lindsay on the stated Presbytery meeting held on November 8, 2011.

- The presbytery celebrated the Lord's Supper and gave thanks for the lives of ruling elders whose earthly lives ended during the past year. During the service, a candle was placed at the front of the sanctuary in memory of Eileen Hastings and Marilyn Gordon, who served COF as ruling elders.
- The Presbytery Nominating Committee is seeking recommendations for commissioners and a young adult advisory delegate to be elected by the presbytery to serve at next summer's General Assembly.

The Presbytery approved a balanced budget for 2012. Per capita is set at \$27.88 for the coming year.

NEW BUSINESS:

ACTION: A motion was adopted to call a special meeting of the congregation to be held on Sunday, December 4, following the morning worship service for the following reasons:

In accordance with section G-2.0902 of the *Book of Order*, to act upon Rev. Smith's request to dissolve the pastoral relationship with the congregation, effective December 31, 2011, and to make recommendations to Presbytery;

To receive a report from the Nominating Committee and to vote on officers for 2012;

To act on rules for congregational meetings e.g. quorum, minimum period of time for notification of meeting, and adoption of parliamentary authority;

To determine the size and composition of the Congregation's Nominating Committee. G-2.0401.

CLOSING: Rev. Smith closed the meeting with prayer. The meeting was adjourned at 8:59 P.M.

The quorum shall be not less than ten percent (10%) of the active members of the congregation and in no case less than three (3) active members.

Minimum Period of Time to Announce Congregational Meetings: ACTION: By motion and vote, the congregation decided to keep the minimum period of time for announcing a congregational meeting the same as it was under the immediately previous PC(USA) constitution. Public notice of the meeting shall be given on two successive Sundays. The meeting may be convened following the notice on the second Sunday.
